
#### Craft is a verb Material Briefing

About It's all about textiles that come from a change of medium: a drawing becomes a digital image, then turns into a jacquard or a hand-stitched pattern. What you see in the final piece still holds the traces and tension of that transformation.

Textiles Jacquard woven pixel surfaces, Hand-embroidered glitches, Screen prints replicating scanner streaks, photocopy lines, overexposed photographs, Tufted or knotted textiles with gaps, overlaps, doubled motifs, Layered voiles and organzas creating low-res blurriness, Digital knit structures, Heat-transfer and sublimation prints with colour bleed, Mixed media textiles, Laser-cut felt or leather echoing vectorized outlines, Upcycled patchworks of scanned and altered motifs, Transparent coatings trapping pencil shavings, tracing paper.




#### Visible co-work

About Al-enhanced, human-finished. The line between craft and code dissolves in objects that begin in machine logic and end with hand-crafted details or vice versa.

Textiles Hand-stitched seams left exposed, Patchwork surfaces combining multiple makers' fragments, Layered fabrics showing different techniques stacked together, Embroideries with overlapping hands and threads, Collaborative weaves where patterns shift mid-process, Mixed media textiles blending distinct craft signatures, Tufted panels worked in varied densities.



#### Sensing nature

About Nature becomes the primary generator of variations, as textiles respond to environmental rhythms like sea tides, rainfall, temperature, or sound waves... producing patterns driven by data, but sourced from nature, not AI.

Textiles Patterns generated from data harvested from nature, Biomimicry, Reactive dyes shifting with temperature or light, Prints responding to rainfall, Woven structures expanding or contracting with humidity, Textiles dyed with seawater or mineral sediments, Fabrics patterned by wind, Sound-driven embroidery translating vibrations into stitches, Knits programmed to undulate like tidal movements.

Textiles Handwoven fabrics with irregular slubs, Unpredictable bleeds, Yarn-dyed warps creating uneven colour flow, Visible seam lines as a feature, Asymmetrical hems and selvages, Overdyed or unevenly faded surfaces, Quilts stitched with irregular spacing, Hand-spun yarns producing inconsistent thickness, Knits stretched or distorted intentionally, Stitches left loose or knotted, Frayed edges incorporated as design, Brush-dyed fabrics with gestural marks, Surfaces showing patina, wear, or mending as feature.



## The uncanny valley



About Hyper-crafted, strangely familiar, just a little off. Textiles that look like relics, at times almost alien. Obsolete tech made ornamental, wires, ports, coils, and conductive threads no longer hidden, but aestheticized.
